

Oulipo

Some members became disillusioned with the chaos Pataphysics seemed to imply. In 1960, Queneau and Le Lionnais formed the *Ouvroir de littérature potentielle* [Oulipo] which instead introduced rules (constraints) that their writing must follow.

Part of the rationale for this was that we don't hesitate to use constraints such as spelling, punctuation and grammar: why not introduce more?

What it is ...

'The Oulipo came to embrace a rigorous formalism, insisting that literary freedom could be unleashed not through the energies of chance, the unconscious, or automatic writing (à la surrealism) but through rule-bound procedures, severe formal restrictions, and mathematical constraints.

Oulipians follow the cunning design of Daedalus rather than the irrational urges of the Minotaur; as Queneau famously said, they are 'rats who construct the labyrinth from which they plan to escape."

What it is ...

According to the Oulipo, there is a big difference between rules (the things you have to do) versus constraints (the arbitrary things you choose to do). The group believed that language is always constrained by something be it time, material, experience, grammar, alphabet, stylistic conventions etc.

Since all writing is constrained, the group felt it best to recognize the existence of constraints and play with them to varying degrees, instead of simply ascribing them as intractable, universal forms.

10 sonnets are laid on top of each other in a manner that allows lines to be interchanged.


This provides 'One hundred million million poems'.

Longer tracts exists: famously, Georges Perec wrote an entire novel [La Disparition] omitting the letter 'e' – the subject of the novel was the missing letter (a translation exists: *A Void*, Gilbert Adair, 1994).




